

Courageous Discipleship

The call to discipleship

(excerpt from *Jesus: An Historical Approximation*, José A. Pagola)

“Jesus’ life as an itinerant brought him very close to the world of indigents. He lived practically as one of them, homeless and without stable employment. He lived among the excluded ones, seeking the reign of God and his justice. Soon he invited the group of followers gathering around him to do the same. They would share the life of those poor. For Jesus, that was the best place to embrace and proclaim the reign of God. Jesus is a realist. He has no political or religious power to transform that situation. He is the prophet of God’s mercy, himself one of the last. His word does not mean an immediate end to the hunger and misery of these people, but it does mean unyielding dignity for all the victims of abuse and exploitation. Everyone needs to know that these people in particular are God’s favourite children, which makes their dignity absolutely real. Their life is sacred. The only way to accept God is to build a world whose first priority is the dignity of the last.”




Changed for the Healing of the World | John Philip Newell
